

Sent by God: His People on His Mission

LESSON 1: Mission and Vision

Missio Dei

These Latin words mean "God's mission". Mission comes from a root which means "to send". God's mission is re-creation--to renew and restore all things. God sent his Son to provide salvation and reconciliation through his death and resurrection. God sent his Spirit to seal, sanctify, and empower God's people in communities of believers. Now God sends his people forth. We are called by God, we are commissioned by God, we are sent by God into his world as ambassadors of hope. All of this is in view in the title of this series: "Sent by God: His People on His Mission". This church has a big view of God and an equally big view of what God wants us to be. Our mission is summarized in the marching orders God gives his people. Our mission ultimately flows from the vision we believe God has given us.

Defining Our Vision

Over five years ago, we sought to understand God's vision for this church. We spent time in Bible classes studying the vision God gave his church in the first century. The church leaders met over several months to evaluate current activities and dream new dreams. From that time of study and prayer came the vision statement we use today: "Seeking, Sharing, Shining the Light." Because the original vision statement was inwardly focused, the concept has at times been adapted to reflect the heart of this church for evangelism and missions: "Lighting the Way to Jesus". While these words have helped shape us as a church, we begin 2009 with an intense desire to renew our commitment to God's mission. suggests a need to redefine our vision so we can better articulate our mission and develop appropriate strategies and goals. These ideas obviously reflect the culture in which we live, but they are rooted also in Scripture.

The Bible and Vision

Throughout the Bible, God provided visions—extraordinary experiences—which allowed his people to see spiritual realities beyond our normal sensory perceptions. In the Old Testament, Abraham, Jacob, Samuel, Daniel and Ezekiel are among those who God empowered as visionaries for his people. In the New Testament, Peter declared on the Day of Pentecost the fulfillment of Joel's prophecy and the pouring out of God's Spirit. The early church accepted this mission from God and spread the gospel to the Gentiles, accompanied by visions. The Bible ends with John's vision of heaven and the triumph of the Lamb and his saints over the forces of evil.

Throughout the Bible, when God provides visions, they serve to build up and advance his people: to warn, guide, reveal, instruct, encourage, and bless. The vision developed five years ago did not come as an ecstatic revelation, but it also serves to build up and advance God's people as he sends us into the world as servants of *Missio Dei*.

What Does God Send Us Forth to Do?

While it may seem a bit backward, we can begin to define a new vision for this church by asking how we understand our mission. What does God send us forth to do? When you leave the building, how do you understand the task and challenges of living the Christian life? What does God expect of you as his child, involved in his mission? That is the subject of this first lesson.
