
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Early Summer Update: God Continues His Marvelous Saving Work!

The last month and a half have been a blur! Mission meetings, planning and conversations with my publisher, mentoring sessions, Bible studies, teaching my Sunday morning Bible class at church—and then the last half of May arrived! I made an eight-day flying trip (pun intended!) to Ecuador and Colombia, returning to the US just before Memorial Day weekend. Eight days packed full and overflowing! After a few days at home, I left for the Dominican Republic the week after Memorial Day. As I write, Father's Day is approaching and Jan and I are anticipating some time with family. It has been an incredibly full but rewarding 45 days.

As I report on my recent mission trips, I want one great truth to shine forth! God is actively working through his dedicated disciples to seek and to save the lost, to bring multitudes to Jesus. The churches are growing, new churches are being planted. How blessed we are to have a small part of God's great big eternal purpose. Never forget: God's Work, Our Hands!





Return to Ecuador

The trip to Ecuador and Colombia had multiple purposes. I was able to get a firsthand update of the state and progress of the churches. I gave counsel and advice, and encouraged the churches. Plus--I was able to teach several Bible studies, one of my favorite things to do. I traveled with a brother from Bella Vista, AR who has had a long-term interest in mission work in Ecuador and Colombia. Since he had not visited the churches since before the pandemic, he asked me to arrange a trip and include him (possibly his last visit—he turns 80 later this year!)

Last year, my visit to Ecuador was cut short when I could not shake a respiratory infection, even with



prescription medication! As a result, I only visited the region around Ibarra. (My early return to the US was providential.)

Ecuador has increasing problems with security. We used to arrive in Quito shortly after midnight and then drive a couple of hours to overnight in Ibarra. No more! It is now necessary to overnight at a hotel near the airport. We were settled in the room by 2:00 AM, which made for a short night. The payoff came with the excellent breakfast buffet.

In **Pilanquí, Ibarra**, a special Thursday night gathering was scheduled (picture left). Between 60 and 70 were present. I spoke about "Knowing Christ."

The Pilanquí church is about 13 years old, biblically organized with elders, deacons, and evangelists. The workers

are largely volunteers. In May the church had an attendance of 235 on Mother's Day. The church has built their own building with a minimum of outside help and is continuing to grow while planting new churches in the region.

One task on my agenda was brainstorming with the leaders about possible steps forward—go to two services, use the fellowship area as overflow with livestream of the worship, begin another congregation. The church now has an



excellent location—an advantage which should not be easily discarded (above, group picture of the church).

I am always glad to be asked to teach home Bible studies as I travel (picture



right). The trip also allowed me to renew my relationship with Germán's family (picture left). Germán is our driver; we refer to his pickup as the "Germán Express." Their daughter, Brenda (on the right side of the picture at left) has grown up over the past five years!

Friday was our last day in

Ecuador. We drove to the border and got our documents in order by late afternoon – with enough time for a cup of coffee before the 6:00 PM Friday meeting with the church in **Tulcán**, **Ecuador** (picture right). The Friday night attendance of 38 was about the same as Sunday morning attendance! That would not happen very often in the US!



After the Friday night meeting in Tulcán, Ecuador, we crossed the border and drove a couple of hours to Tuquerres—home base until Sunday afternoon.

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On Saturday, we visited the church in **Cumbal** and were delighted to see that they had completed the work of putting a second story on the building. The story of the Cumbal building begins a few years ago with their purchase of a lot (after many years of meeting in the home of one of the members). They agreed to purchase half of the needed materials, I agreed to purchase

other half, and they agreed to either hire or do all the construction. When Jan and I were there in 2019, the result was the first floorwith some plastic protection in place on the upper level (picture above left). Now they have completed the second story with their own resources (picture above right).

After lunch, about 28 assembled for the afternoon conference—pretty much the entire church for a Saturday afternoon event (picture right).





On Sunday I preached in **Túquerres**, where the local church was joined by 12 Christians who came from **Samaniego**. There were 38 in attendance for worship and the shared fellowship meal (picture below).





I share also an excellent picture of **Jairo and Andrea** (picture right). I am grateful for their heart for the Lord's work, at great sacrifice, serving unselfishly in southern Colombia among a group of eight churches.

Late Sunday evening, we transferred to **Pasto** in preparation for the Monday special event with the church.



With 84 in attendance, we again witnessed the commitment of our brothers and sisters and their desire to participate in the work. Monday night attendance was higher than the Sunday average (picture left).

An early Tuesday flight to Bogota required being at the airport about 6:15 AM (the airport is about an hour outside the city). Another early morning!

In **Bogota**, we spent considerably time reconstructing the story of the churches of Christ in Bogota over the past 30+ years. On Wednesday we visited several possible locations available for purchase. (The community center the Los Angeles church has been renting is planned for demolition as part of a street-widening project.) Wednesday evening, we met with church leaders for a final

debriefing before catching a midnight flight to the US. Eight days, five different beds, not counting overnight flights. The body grows weary but the spirit is strengthened!

Dominican Republic—My Third Visit in the Past Eight Months

This trip was designed to introduce two brothers, **Arvy Dupuy** and **Jay Gregory**, to "all things Dominican." These brothers have been working in Haiti (**Liberté Ministries**) for several years but at present Haiti is closed. The trip served to explore partnership possibilities in God's mission to take the gospel to the entire island of Hispaniola (picture, a visit to Los Cocos to evaluate needs, Manuel's recently purchased pickup is visible in the picture).

Cajamarca, Peru—Seeking a Fresh Foothold

Please pray for the work in Cajamarca. The church planter is on site, but reactivating the dozen or so previous members has been more challenging than expected. LALD provides support for the evangelist, with the help of a

generous family in Oklahoma. God gives the increase. An organized plan to make personal contacts in the city is underway. Pray that more of the dozen members who were attending previously will become active again, providing a good nucleus for continued growth (picture left, a Sunday morning worship in May; picture right, the children singing, sharing what they learned in their class). Note: Many Latin



American churches have class and worship in parallel – class for the children, worship for the adults.
